Swarming season is upon us! The heavy Manzanita flow and copious pollen have led to large colony populations and crowded boxes. The bees respond by swarming. Some of my yards are issuing several swarms a day, despite our efforts to split them in advance!

You can help to alleviate the swarm impulse by either giving your hives more empty comb in the broodnest, or by splitting them.

It looks like it could be a good year for honey production, so if you can keep your colonies from swarming, you could make a good crop!

For everyone's information, I am getting out of the "business" of selling equipment, now that Dan Wheat at A to Z Supply has agreed to stock beekeeping equipment locally. The sales were never profitable for me, and I only did it as a public service. I do have a few closeout items left—zipper suits, hive tools, smokers, but they are going fast. I encourage everyone to support A to Z so that Dan will continue to maintain

a local beekeeping supply. Please let him know of any items that you feel that he should carry.

The weather has not been cooperating for queen mating, so nucs are running a little late this season—please be patient.

From the Librarian...

The library contains 5 small pamphlets: "Bee Venom Research", "Apium Virus Monographs", "Basic Bee Venom in Products", "Bee Acupuncture and Bee Sting Therapy", and "Bee Venom Therapy- Supplies and Books" authored by Mihaly Simics of Apitronic Services, British Columbia, Canada which advertises itself as the major continuous supplier of quality honey bee venom in North America and a major source for bee venom therapy materials such as: (1) hard to find books on treatment and the therapy protocols (allergy test, dose calculation, injection technique, nutritional guidelines, etc) for using bee venom to treat Lyme Disease, MS, Arthritis, Rheumatism and even canine and equine ailments and (2) the venom itself, in injectable solutions and, more pertinent to our use (since the venom can only be purchased with a physicians prescription) are three ointments for general purchase which serve as analgesics and claim to relieve bacterial, viral and fungal infections which makes one wonder why there hasn't been a lot more research and

development here in the US, but, oh yes, no patent = no big money for research.

Apitronics is also a major, if not the major, supplier of venom collector devices which consist of frames with electrical wiring that stimulate the bees to "sting" an attached rubber membrane which does not harm the bees. The beginner, expandable, kit is available for only a bit less than a small electric honey extractor which, unfortunately, puts it out of the range of most "just for home" users, but is a small investment for some enterprising beekeeper to make value added hive products, creams, lotions and ointments from Apis venom.

Of course, there is much, much more to learn about all this, after all, venom is a toxic substance and, once again we're climbing the, seemingly forever, learning curve, but the potential health benefits to the community and demand in the local market and possibility of buyers from drug companies, laboratories, research institutes, compounding pharmacies, etc., seem like enough reasons for someone to give this material some serious thought. Wouldn't it be great to be able to get a product like this from someone in the association?

Disclaimer...I'm not getting any kick back from Apitronics, in fact, Mr.Simics includes a very extensive list of web sites for Apitherapy Societies and other sources of products, I'm just very impressed by his willingness to make his devices, materials and information available to everyone.

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April 4th Minutes

Vice-pres Jeremiah Farrell opened with Q&A. August is the critical time to monitor and treat for Varroa, or the winter brood may fail. Karla Hansen's swarm roster is at <ncbees.org> but Jeremiah warns us to question the species of insects and the height and terrain before investing time and gasoline on a wild-wasp chase. A swarm in a tree may be shaken into a carton or couple of frames raised on a pole. A swarm on the ground probably has no queen. Remove captured swarm at dusk. Smoke will disperse leftovers. With a virgin queen, egg laying will be in 10-

12 days. Starting with a queen cell may take longer. Full brood cycle is 21 days, 24 days for drones. A to Z supply on Ridge Road has a full line of bee supplies 273-6608. Honey Glazed Ham

Recipe from the National Honey Board Website



Makes 4 servings

- 2 (8 oz. each) ham steaks, cooked
- 1/4 cup honey
- 3 Tablespoons water
- 1-1/2 teaspoons dry mustard
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves

Pan-fry or broil ham steaks until lightly browned and thoroughly heated. Remove ham from skillet or broiler pan. Combine honey, water, spices; add to pan drippings and bring to a boil. Simmer 1 to 2 minutes. Brush over ham and serve with remaining sauce.
